

GFMC Tool 7 – National Round Tables on Landscape Fire Management

Brief description of the tool: In many countries the awareness of the magnitude and consequences of landscape fires (wildfires, land-use fires) is not developed, i.e. fire occurrence / impacts, fire management options, importance of the role of civil society in the management of fire (sound / benign fire application; avoidance of unnecessary or detrimental burning practices; prevention of wildfires; self-defence / local management including suppression at local level).

Target groups: National Round Tables are designed to convene all stakeholders that are legally mandated (responsible) or potentially to be involved in landscape fire management at landscape level, including representation of civil society, to develop a fire management policy, an implementation strategy and an action plan to address the defined issues.
