Jesusita Fire

On May 5th, at approximately 1:45 p.m. a fire began in the Cathedral Peak area.

The fire response is being administered by a Unified Command consisting of the Santa Barbara Fire Department, Santa Barbara County Fire Department, Montecito Fire, and the US Forest Service.

The call center is closed for the night and wll reopen at 7:00 AM, May 11th.

The Jesusita Fire County Call Center is now reopened at **805-681-5197**. The public may call for information on the fire, evacuations (including assistance for persons who require non-emergency medical assistance and transportation), shelters, road closures, and other information.

Water Conservation

To conserve water and protect local water quality, please avoid hosing ash down the gutters and into storm drains. Instead, we recommend sweeping ash into nearby landscaped areas or picking it up and placing it into the trash.

Since the ash is everywhere, this message and these cleanup methods should be used wherever ash is found.

Maintaining the elevation of the water levels in the reservoirs is essential for the fire department, in order to fight the fire. Please conserve water as much as possible within or without the evacuation zones. If you evacuate, please turn off your water service to avoid potential loss of water pressure in the affected area.

Shelters

The American Red Cross, Santa Barbara County Chapter has placed its Emergency Shelter at Dos Pueblos High School on standby status as of 12 noon today through 12 noon tomorrow at which time it will be closed. Anyone in need of a safe place to stay due to the Jesusita Fire is encouraged to go to the Red Cross Emergency Shelter at the MAC Center on the UCSB Campus. This shelter will be open 24 hours a day until further notice.

MANDATORY EVACUATION ORDER

EFFECTIVE AT 9:00 PM May 10th –THE CURRENT MANDATORY EVACUATION ORDERS IN EFFECT HAVE BEEN DOWNGRADED TO AN EVACUATION WARNING.

RESIDENTS ARE FREE TO RETURN TO THEIR HOMES IN THE FOLLOWING AREAS:

TUNNEL ROAD NORTH OF MONTROSE, PALAMINO ROAD NORTH OF WILLIAMS WAY, SAN ROQUE ROAD NORTH OF THE WATER TREATMENT PLANT.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT AN EVACUATION WARNING STILLS EXISTS IN THE ABOVE AREAS.

RESIDENTS RETURNING ARE CAUTIONED TO REMAIN AWARE OF THE POTENTIAL FOR AN EVACUATION ORDER ON SHORT NOTICE.


THE PUBLIC IS REMINDED TO KEEP OUT OF THE REMAINING MANDATORY EVACUATION ORDER AREAS: PAINTED CAVE ROAD AT HWY 154, PAINTED CAVE ROAD TO EAST CAMINO CIELO, EAST CAMINO CIELO TO HWY 154, HWY 154 TO PAINTED CAVE ROAD. EAST CAMINO CIELO AND GIBRALTAR ROAD REMAIN CLOSED.

Definitions

An Evacuation Order means that residents are being directed to leave their homes immediately.

An evacuation warning means that residents should be prepared to leave immediately if their area is upgraded to an Order.
